THE RAYMORE **ARTS COMMISSION** MET IN REGULAR SESSION TUESDAY, **MARCH 10, 2020,** IN THE COUNCIL CHAMBERS IN CITY HALL AT 100 MUNICIPAL CIRCLE, RAYMORE, MISSOURI. COMMISSIONERS PRESENT WERE: JONES, SETSER, GRIBBLE, YOUNG, BERRY, SIMPSON. ALSO PRESENT: COMMUNICATIONS MANAGER MELISSA HARMER.

a. Public Art Committee

Commissioner Berry gave a review of the March 5 Public Art Committee meeting, including:

- iv. Currently working on banner ideas and placement ideas for 58Highway

7. Staff Reports

- a. Melissa Harmer mentioned the new artist in the Chamber Gallery and asked commissioners to share information with fellow artists about display opportunities. Commissioner Simpson asked if the artists had to be Raymore residents. Harmer stated guidelines were recently changed to allow residents from surrounding areas, as well as younger artists (16 and up), to apply to display art at City Hall.
- b. Budget Update

To date, the Arts Commission has spent \$950 of its \$30,000 FY2020 Budget.

c. Events updates

Commissioner Berry, Kelly Fizer and Melissa Harmer had their first Summer Scene meeting prior to the March 10 Arts Commission meeting. Harmer is ordering Raymore Arts Commission branded crayons and is working on creating a coloring book of public art and other areas in Raymore for giveaways at upcoming events.

Commissioner Setser moved to approve the January meeting minutes. Commissioner Young seconded. The Commission voted 5-0 to approve.

Commissioner Jones talked about the upcoming MACCA conference. Commissioner Simpson offered to be the third person on the public art committee. Jones assigned the remaining commissioners to an outreach committee to find area talent for programs and said he would put some materials together for reference.

Commissioner Berry thanked staff and said he was looking forward to working on Summer Scene.

Commissioner Young said the outreach committee sounded like a great opportunity to capitalize on the talent pool. Young said going on a national scale to find an artist for the Hawk Ridge Park Sculpture is a good opportunity.

Commissioner Simpson seconded Young's comments and was impressed the website could reach so many people.

Commissioner Gribble didn't have a comment.

Commissioner Setser thanked Harmer for her help each week with Public Arts and taking lead on the coloring book.

Commissioner Jones thanked Berry for sticking with the Little Free Library campaign and making it happen. Simpson also thanked Berry. Harmer mentioned that the new Raymore Parks & Recreation Recreation Coordinator Corinne Daut had some great ideas for arts classes this summer and asked commissioners to keep sponsorship and partnership opportunities in mind.

This would be the same reimbursement process with a deadline to install and register the Little Free Library by Oct. 1, 2020, so as to ensure the reimbursement comes out of our current fiscal year budget.

The other applications were from Ward Park Place Homeowners Association, Wood Creek of the Good Ranch Homeowners Association and Creekmoor Property Owners Association.

Re: Approval of Selection of Artist Leslie Tharp for Hawk Ridge Park Sculpture Project

The Raymore Arts Commission's Public Arts Committee has selected artist Leslie Tharp to conceptualize and fabricate a sculpture for Hawk Ridge Park.

Tharp is a metal artist from Gainesville, Florida, with 10 years of experience in public art. Please see the following pages for her artist statement, resume and work samples.

The Public Art Committee is seeking the full Raymore Arts Commission approval to proceed with the next steps to schedule a conference call with Tharp to discuss the project and receive a final proposed concept for the art piece. The Public Art Committee will make its recommendation to the commission at the June 9 or July 14 Raymore Arts Commission meeting. The original project timeline has been delayed a bit, but we are still anticipating a fall installation.

I am a metal artist in Gainesville, FL that specializes in large-scale public art and hands-on blacksmithing workshops. It is my belief that public art has the power to surprise and delight people, and through that engagement there is an opportunity for meaningful conversation. Curiosity exists in us all, and through projects like this we are able to add layers of thoughtfulness to the community's exploration of a space.

This project is a wonderful opportunity to explore the natural wonders of Hawk Ridge Park, and to bring those visions to visitor of the park. My work is anchored in exploring the form of local flora and fauna, in the spaces I work in, and conceptualizing the ways we see ourselves as part of or separated from these subjects. The way we engage with those plants and animals differs culture to culture and even throughout the country. By highlighting them, through interactive public art, I believe I can spark curiosity and conversation in visitors that reflects on the place they are in, and the ways they engage with the world around them.

If chosen for this project, I would first seek feedback from the Art Committee on what themes they may find the most engaging to their local environment. My initial approach would entail exploring the native animal and plant species seen within Hawk Ridge Park and developing a large-scale work based on those themes.

The location of the piece will indicate what additional elements may carry the theme forward- lighting, rain, shade, the possibility to add power for evening lighting and viewing, potential need for seating near the work or as part of the work, engagement with young viewers- children, as well as long term maintenance needs and vandalism concerns, etc.

My 10 years of public art experience have helped me to develop this approach, and my strong reputation as a metalworker and metalworking instructor ensures that I can work to bring this concept to fruition within budget and with the highest level of craftspersonship possible.

I thoroughly appreciate your consideration of my application.


