• No Tax Increase General Obligation Bond Issues, Aug. 4. Raymore voters will have the opportunity to vote for two separate No Tax Increase G.O. Bond Issues at the polls on Aug. 4. If approved, these measures will bring more than \$23.5 million in improvements to Raymore's streets and parks without increasing the current property tax levy. Question 1 proposes more than \$17.5 million in improvements for streets, including a total reconstruction of Ward Road and Kurzweil Road, extensions of Johnston Drive, Sunset Lane and 163rd Street,, I-49 widening from 155th Street to North Cass Parkway and street lights in two Raymore neighborhoods. Question 2 proposes \$5.9 million in improvements to the Raymore park system. Learn more about each proposed project and see a map of project locations at raymore.com/bondprojects.

Development Services

- GIS Coordinator Heather Eisenbarth created a GO Bond storymap that provides an overview and illustrates the location of the projects included in the No Tax Increase General Obligation Bond Issues to be decided by the voters on Tuesday, Aug. 4.
- The Planning and Zoning Commission, as part of the <u>annual review</u> of the Unified Development Code, directed staff to prepare the 32nd amendment to the UDC incorporating the code language changes proposed by staff. The Planning and Zoning Commission will consider the amendment at a public hearing on Sept. 15.
- 17 residents attended the Good Neighbor meeting for the <u>Park Side</u> Subdivision, a 325 lot single-family residential development proposed for 155 acres located south of 163rd Street and west of North Madison Street. The Planning and Zoning Commission will consider the application on Aug. 18.
- A Good Neighbor meeting for the proposed expansion of the <u>Oak Ridge Farms</u> subdivision will be held on Wednesday, July 15 at 6:30 p.m. in the City Council Chambers. 23 single-family units and 68 two-family units are proposed.

Parks & Recreation

• The Parks and Recreation Department hosted the first night of the Raymore Farmers Market. The market will be open from 4- 7 p.m. every Tuesday on Municipal Circle. Parking will be available in the open grass lot and more accessible parking for people with disabilities will be available at Centerview.

- The Parks and Recreation Board met in special session on Monday night to discuss parkland dedication in the Brookside Subdivision.
- This week's theme at the Raymore Summer Camp was "Outdoorsman Week."
 Campers fished Johnston Lake at Hawk Ridge Park, roasted marshmallows at the fire pit in Moon Valley Park, played at the Fort and practiced first aid by making tourniquets for fake injuries. This year's group of campers are very good at fake screams from fake injuries for their fake tourniquets!
- The first Grand Slam Tournament of the season will be held at Recreation Park.
 The tournament will be Friday through Sunday with around 30 teams participating.
