- Raymore Arts
 Commissioners handed
 out 2021 event passports at opening day of the Raymore Farmers Market. The passports are available for free in the lobby of Raymore City Hall and list arts and community events through the rest of the year. Passport holders can get stamps when they attend specific events and be eligible for drawings for prizes at the end of the year.
- The Raymore Arts Commission hosted its first free concert of the year on Thursday at Hawk Ridge Park with Raymore musician Bradley Harris.

- The June 8 Raymore Arts Commission meeting is canceled.

Development Services

- The United States Census Bureau released its annual population estimates. As of July 1, 2020, the population estimate for Raymore is 22,532. The Decennial Census count for Raymore, the official population count for the City as of April 1, 2020, will be released in September.
- City Planner Katie Jardieu graduated from the KU Public Management Center's Emerging Leaders Academy.
- Economic Development Director David Gress and the City's Internal Economic
 Development Team conducted a building and site tour of the <u>Raymore Commerce</u>
 <u>Center</u> with Missouri Partnership and site selection consultant Ginovus. Raymore
 was selected this year to participate in the state-wide Raise the Bar Assessment
 Program, which assesses the competitiveness of communities across Missouri in
 their business attraction efforts.
- Garrett Linville, representing Thompson Thrift Developers, for property owner Raymore Galleria LLC, filed a request to reclassify the zoning of 21 acres located on the east side of Dean Avenue, south of Sam's Club, from "C-3" Regional Commercial District to "R-3B" <u>Apartment Community</u> District to allow for the development of an apartment community. A "Good Neighbor" meeting is scheduled for June 23 at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall.

Parks & Recreation

- Recreation Superintendent Jimmy Gibbs cleaned water jets, balanced chemical levels and conducted an overall inspection of the Variety KC All-Inclusive Sprayground at T.B. Hanna Station.
- The Raymore Parks and Recreation Summer Day Camp completed the first week of the summer. More than 100 campers participated in the LEGO themed week.
- Work continues in planning the Spirit of America Celebration scheduled for July 2nd at Recreation Park.
- Recreational baseball, softball & tee ball pictures were held this week at Recreation Park and Memorial Park.
- Tiny Tee ball begins this week on Thursday and Saturday at Memorial Park. Each class has been filled to capacity.
- Park Maintenance staff worked on irrigation at Centerview, City Hall and the RAC. The crew also planted flowers at the round-a-bouts at Dean Avenue and South Madison Str.
- The timer switch at the tennis courts at Recreation Park has been repaired.

Animal Control

- Animal Control Officers Jamie Hasenyager and Bailey Romi worked their miracles once again and have completely cleared the shelter, with NO animals currently available for adoption.
- For the last few weeks, the Raymore Animal shelter has been at capacity with 3-7 dogs at a time, eight cats and kittens in our kennels, and approximately 80 kittens and three dogs in foster homes. With our combined resources, friends and marketing abilities, we were able to place two dogs and three cats into rescue, three dogs into their forever home, and all 80 kittens have been pre-adopted! This means that all of our kittens are adopted before even being of age to leave their mom!
- The social media reach of friends of the Raymore Animal Shelter brought this adoptive parent all the way from Springfield to get her forever pet.
- The Animal Shelter is coordinating a fundraiser/ adoption event to be hosted by a local yoga instructor. More details to follow in the coming weeks!
