Development Services

- Whataburger filed a request for site plan approval for a new restaurant facility at 1921 W. Foxwood Drive. The existing Golden Corral building will be demolished and replaced with a 3,746 square foot restaurant. The Planning and Zoning Commission will consider the request on August 17.
- Code Enforcement Officer Drayton Vogel participated in a webinar hosted by the Mid America Regional Planning Council on how communities can combat illegal dumping activities.
- Building Official Jon Woerner commenced review on building construction plans for a proposed 1.024 million square foot industrial building located on Lot 3 in the Raymore Commerce Center on Dean Avenue, south of North Cass Parkway. Site grading work has already begun. VanTrust is constructing the speculative building. This will be the 2nd building in the Raymore Commerce Center.

- A Good Neighbor meeting was held Wednesday for the proposed rezoning of 8
 acres located west of Dean Avenue and south of Lucy Webb Road to allow for
 <u>Ridgeview Estates</u>, a 60-unit age and income restricted residential development.
 The Planning and Zoning Commission will consider the request on August 17.
- Director Jim Cadoret, Assistant City Manager Mike Ekey and Public Works Director Mike Krass participated in a webinar sponsored by the US Green Building Council to learn more about the LEED green building program.
- The Aug. 3 meeting of the Planning and Zoning Commission has been cancelled.
- A Good Neighbor meeting is scheduled for Aug. 4 at 6:30 p.m. at City Hall for the request to reclassify the zoning of the undeveloped west 46 acres of the <u>Madison Valley</u> Subdivision from "R-1" Single-Family Residential District to the "R-1.5" Single-Family Residential District to allow for Phase 2 of the Madison Valley Subdivision. A preliminary plat consisting of 154 single-family homes was also filed.

Parks & Recreation

- Centerview hosted the Raymore Chamber of Commerce Luncheon, a local HOA meeting, and the Community Blood Drive event.
- Athletic Coordinator Brennon met with a vendor to explore options for live, subscription based remote video streaming services.
- Park staff have begun the arduous task of preparing trails for the annual Mini Mud Run event at Hawk Ridge Park. Staff also mowed and completed maintenance on the mountain bike trail system.
- Superintendent Rulo has placed orders to replace damaged playground equipment.
- Recreation and athletic staff are finalizing edits for the 2021 Fall Activity Guide.
- Park staff completed beautification projects in several parking lot islands and rain gardens throughout Recreation Park and Hawk Ridge Park.
- Superintendent Rulo is receiving quotes to remove a series of hazardous trees in the park system.
