Raymore Celebrates Grand Opening Of Hawk's Nest Inclusive Playground

History was made at the grand opening of the Hawk's Nest All-Inclusive Playground at Hawk Ridge Park on May 1, 2023, as Raymore became the only city in the United States to offer three fully accessible play spaces to its residents and visitors.

Guests joined City of Raymore staff and members of the Raymore city council, the park and recreation board and other boards and commissions for the ribbon cutting.

"This playground levels the playing ground for everybody,"
Raymore Parks and Recreation Director Nathan Musteen said. "It's
life changing for some folks. It creates normalcy for others who
don't have it and it brings family and people together. That's the
theme of our city, coming home to more. That's what we want to
do."

The city partnered with Unlimited Play, a not-for-profit organization, to bring the inclusive playground to Hawk Ridge Park at 701 Johnston Pkwy. Executive Director Natalie Mackay's son was born with a severe disability. He used a wheelchair and liked to play like everyone else, but he was limited to sitting on the edge and watching the other children play because he couldn't access the playground. Mackay was determined to provide a place for her son to play and founded Unlimited Play for that purpose. The organization now works nationwide to help bring fully accessible playgrounds to communities.

Mackay said that inclusive

Mackay said that inclusive playgrounds are life changing for her family and for families just like hers in Raymore.

"You believed that every single community member deserves the right to play, and I stand in front of you as a mom to say thank you," Mackay said. "Thank you for all of the families who deserve the right to play."



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The universally accessible playground is specially designed to give children with disabilities and critical illnesses the same opportunities for play, exercise, and social interactions as any other child. Children and their caregivers can access all areas of the playground thanks to the smooth, spongy surfacing, ramps from bottom to top, and accessible play equipment.

Hawk's Nest features play pieces that integrate the senses, encourage social play, and allow children to climb, spin, and slide.

The Hawk's Nest was funded by the city's park fund and general fund, grants from the Missouri Department of Natural Resources State Parks Division's Land Water Conservation Fund (LWCF) and Sunderland Foundation, and donations from multiple area organizations, businesses, and individuals.

Many playgrounds in the country are inaccessible to people with disabilities, yet play is a critical part of the cognitive, physical, and social development of every child. Inclusive play environments eliminate social and physical barriers and allow children with disabilities and able-bodied children to play together, promoting understanding and new relationships.

Members of the Raymore Parks and Recreation Department and the parks and recreation board are committed to improving the quality of life for residents and creating opportunities for people of all abilities. A playground should not be a barrier to a child, parent, or caregiver with different abilities. Hawk's Nest is the third universally accessible play space in Raymore, Joining the Variety KC Inclusive Playground and the Variety KC Inclusive Sprayground at T.B. Hanna Station at 214 S. Washington St.

Prior to the addition of Hawk's Nest, Hawk Ridge Park became the state of Missouri's first inclusive park in 2019, with a renovation that provided several fully accessible amenities, including a fishing dock, bridge, jetty, shelter house, family restrooms, paved walking trail around Johnston Lake, an amphitheater with a stage accessible via gently sloping concrete walkway (no steps!) and expanded parking and additional ADA restrooms at the alternate entrance.

Hawk Ridge Park and T.B. Hanna Station have each won national awards for their universal design by the American Public Works Association (APWA).

5 Year Capital Improvement Program

Background / Justification:

The Capital Budget is a product of the Capital Improvement Program (CIP), it represents a 5 year plan of capital projects. Each year, the Park Board reviews capital projects and the 5 year plan. PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Project - Construction of an event plaza on the east side of Hawk Ridge Park. This would be included in the 2020 No Tax Increase Bond Project approved by voters to build a parking lot and trail connection to the Johnston Lake Loop Trail.

This project would be used for construction and as matching funding for a grant application for the Land Water Conservation Fund Federal Grant.

PROJECT JUSTIFICATION

The Plaza is designed to be the main rental attraction at Hawk Ridge Park to complement the Amphitheater for outdoor events such as concerts, weddings and receptions.

BUDGET IMPACT

Addition of routine trash and facility maintenance would be expected. Minimal expense in supplies, just additional labor.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Project - construction of a new full-court outdoor basketball facility at Hawk Ridge Park at the Ridge Athletic Area. This court will not have lights.

PROJECT JUSTIFICATION

The Ridge Athletic Area on the west side of Hawk Ridge Park is the ideal location for an outdoor basketball court on the north side of town. Long requested by residents to add another outdoor basketball court due to overuse of the only court at Recreation Park, this location has parking, restrooms, trail access and is set in the heart of residential areas on the north side of town.

An additional outdoor basketball court is in the 20 year Capital Project Plan of the Parks and Recreation Board.

BUDGET IMPACT

No budget increase is expected. Outdoor restrooms are already under contract and routine park maintenance is already scheduled with the Parks Maintenance Division.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

The Project -

- Removal of the old skatepark equipment and fence near the Public Works facility at Recreation Park.
- Crack Sealing, resurfacing and painting of the concrete pad
- Installation of three regulation size outdoor pickleball courts
- Installation of a 6ft tall black vinyl chain link fence with entrance gates around the court
- Installation of court lights

With the relocation of the skatepark to the north side of Recreation Park, the concrete pad located under the old skatepark is the perfect size to install three pickleball courts for outdoor play. The pad has been inspected and is still in great shape for continued use.

PROJECT JUSTIFICATION

Pickleball is the fastest growing sport in the United States and can be played by all ages. Its popularity has required staff to overlay lines on the tennis courts to meet demands, but the dimensions are not the same. This is a popular request by residents every year.

Using the old skatepark location that includes a concrete pad, parking lot, water fountain and trail access including restrooms nearby at the baseball concession stand make this a great project that saves over \$300,000 dollars for new construction that was estimated if built at Hawk Ridge Park.
