Track the City's progress during winter weather

Starting in 2017, the City's Public Works department will begin offering a new tool that will allow residents to track the progress of snow plowing during winter weather.

The City's new snow plow tracking system will give live updates throughout a winter weather storm showing what streets have been treated and plowed and what work remains.

"This new system will give residents a glimpse into how hard our crews work to clear the streets during a snowstorm," Public Works Director Mike Krass said. "It will also allow them to stay up-to-date on when their streets are next in line for being treated."

As part of the new snow map, the City is also introducing a Snow Help Line that will be active during snowstorms. That number is **816-892-3090**.

Residents can call this line if they have questions about snow plowing or want to report a hazardous roadway/intersection. It will be staffed from 7 a.m. - 7 p.m. while the plows are mobilized and clearing the streets.

It's the law: Renew your pet's registration

Owning a dog or cat requires all sorts of responsibility. One that is often overlooked is registering your pet with the city and getting them properly licensed.

Failing to license your pet can hinder your chances of getting him or her back if picked up by the City Animal Control Officers and can earn you a fine. More importantly, it lets our officers and other residents know that your favorite four-legged friend is up-to-date with their vaccinations.

If you have not yet obtained your pet's 2017 registration, you will need to do so as soon as possible.

Heres how:

Visit **www.Raymore.com/AnimalControl** to download an application and return it to the Utiltities Office at 100 Municipal Circle.

You must provide a certificate showing that your dog is up to date with its vaccinations.

Licences are \$5 for spayed/neutered pets or \$20 for each unspayed/neutered pet.

Pets MUST be licensed each year by Jan. 1.



Along with the full basketball court, the building will also include a three-lane walking/running track. To help support the facility there will be an office for staff and a kitchen to be used for concessions during bigger sporting events.

Designs are working through the approval process and construction is expected to begin later this spring.

The competitive league is now looking to expand and build on the success of 2016.

Raymore Parks & Recreation superintendent John McLain might have just closed the books on the inaugural season for the Raymore United Soccer Club, but he is already looking to the future.

"We learned a lot this season," McLain said. "But from what we have heard from our coaches and players, this was an incredibly successful season and we look forward to kicking off 2017."

The Raymore United Soccer Club brought a new level of competitive soccer to players looking to improve their skills and travel across the region to play against some of the most elite teams in the area. With more than 50 kids signed up across three teams, McLain said he considered

the first season a big success that drew interest from different corners of the community.

"We knew from the beginning we wanted this league to be something different," McLain said. "We wanted it to be something that challenged our players and really prepared them for the next level of play."

Even before the first whistle, McLain organized several training sessions with professional coaches and trainers to work with interested players in an intense camp setting. Trainers from the Challenger Sports Group worked one-on-one with players to develop skills and a workplan on what areas might have needed improvement.

"Our goal was to get anyone who was interested, regardless of their beginning skill, to a place

where they could compete," McLain said.

After the training sessions and tryouts, the professional trainers stayed with each team and worked with team coaches to continue to develop players and check in on their progress throughout the season.

It was this unique aspect of the Raymore United Soccer Club that stood out to coaches and made the program special.

"This league is about the kids. It is about making them better," Coach Rich Bartow said. "I would not be here doing this if it were about anything else."

Coach Bartow is a veteran coach with both recreation and competitive leagues. For him, the Raymore United Club brought him back to the core of why he got into coaching in the first place.

Bartow had previously coached in competitive leagues, but was excited to not only coach in his hometown league, but also to have the support and guidance of the professional trainers for himself and his players throughout the season.

"It makes a huge difference having the guidance of these trainers not only for the players individually, but for me as a coach running practice and seeing the improvement of these players from day-to-day," Bartow said.

Individual Players

Individual players that are not already part of a team must participate in the Raymore United tryouts in June. Following tryouts, all individual participants are given a skills assessment and will be directed to the appropriate level of play provided by Raymore Parks & Recreation. Individual players selected for the Raymore United Soccer Club will be placed on a team to participate in a more competitive environment, which includes travel throughout the region and tournaments.

Individual fees will range between \$75 to \$125 per season based on the number of players on the team. These fees are paid to the team manager.

Team Registration

Raymore United also offers team registration for established teams interested in playing through the Raymore United Soccer Club.

Teams playing for Raymore United Soccer Club have two options for league play:

- 1. Kansas City Metro League (KCML) Home games held at Recreation Park
- 2. Heartland Soccer Association Games held at the Overland Park Soccer Complex and other affiliated locations

Additional fees are required for both options in addition to team registration fees. League participation and pricing scales are available to coaches and managers at the Parks & Recreation Office.

*Uniforms are ordered and provided to a player every two years. If a uniform gets damaged and requires replacement, replacement fees will be charged to the player.

Where do my property taxes go?

For every dollar you pay toward your property taxes, here is where that money goes:

Roughly \$0.63 goes to the Ray-Pec School District.



About \$0.21 goes to South Metro Fire, Cass County Road and Bridge, Library, Hospital, Shelter workshop and the State.



A little more than \$0.16 goes to Raymore.



This list represents each taxing entity that appears on a Raymore resident's property tax bill (unless you also live in a special taxing district). These rates have been certified by the Cass County Collector's office.

Each December, Cass County sends property tax bills to residents. The revenue generated from these taxes funds many important functions at the City and County level.

At the City of Raymore, we think it is important that you understand exactly where that money goes.

Cass County determines your residential property taxes by taxing 19 percent of the market value of your property. That creates an assessed value that is divided by 100 and then multiplied by the current tax rate. For example, Raymore residents pay a tax rate of 8.0226 (unless you are living in a special taxing district).

The graph to the left shows where every dollar of your tax payment goes.

What does the City of Raymore do with my property taxes?

Although there is only one rate listed on the bill from the County, the \$0.16 received by the City goes to three distinct areas:

General Fund: \$0.06

This supports the day-to-day staff and programs at City Hall like Public Works, Community Development, Police, etc. In all, property taxes generate about \$1.3 million for this part of the City's budget.

Parks & Recreation Fund: \$0.02

This directly funds our city's parks and programing. This generates about \$352,000 for the Parks & Recreation department.

Debt Service Fund: \$0.08

This fund is how the City pays for its financial obligations for a variety of projects.

These three make up Raymore's 1.3057 (or 16 percent) of your property taxes.

BUDGET IN BRIEF: FY 2017


Each year the Mayor, City Council and staff work together to develop Raymore's annual budget. But the City's budget is more than just a financial document. This budget is a reflection of the priorities set by our residents who have come to expect high quality City services.

The annual budget also serves as a roadmap for the direction of Raymore in the coming year. It dictates, in a transparent and open way, how the City uses taxpayer money to meet the demands of our growing community and demonstrates how we continue to plan for our future.

In FY2017, the City is budgeting for a revenue of \$18.4 million. As shown below the revenue collected by the City comes from a variety of places, including: sales taxes, property taxes, franchise taxes and other fees/licenses.

To prepare the annual budget, city staff looks critically at each department and program and must justify a need for each dollar requested in the proposed budget in a modified form of zero-based budgeting.


Why is this important?

Because under this form of budgeting every department must prepare a budget as if it were being

done for the first time.

The requests from each department must also fall in line with the priorities set out by Council and the City's overall strategic plan.

This year's budget is no exception as the operating budget of \$16.98 million is focused on continuing to provide quality services and expand in areas where the need is necessary to meet expectations and demand.

BOND ISSUE PROJECTS

On April 5, 2016, Raymore voters approved two measures that will bring \$10.05 million worth of improvements to the City's streets and parks programs.

These projects are in direct response to resident feedback through a number of citizen surveys and represent one of large investments in the community's parks and recreation department.

Residents may have noticed that some of these projects are already under construction while others are still in the planning phases. Bond Projects Showing Progress

For more than two months, contractors have been busy moving dirt at the corner of Municipal Circle and Broadmoor Drive — just behind City Hall.

Although it is tough to tell from the early work, this site is being prepared for construction of Raymore's newest event and meeting space, Centerview.

The name, Centerview, marks not only how this building will serve as the heart and center of our community, but also reflects back on our history as it shares its name with one of the original country schools that served Raymore.

As work continues there, the City has also successfully completed or made significant progress on several other voter-approved bond projects.

- In Recreation Park, contractors have already completed the parking lot improvements and continue to work on the walking trail rehabilitation.
- Designs are nearing completion for the new recreation activity center, a multi-use building that will include parks offices, a gymnasium and other amenities that will support our indoor recreation needs.
- One of the most visible voter-approved projects that has been completed was the milling and overlay of 58 Highway. While we know the construction might have inconvenienced some, it was critical that we undertook this project to ensure the life of the roadway for another 10 years or more.






