Community Development

- The Planning & Zoning Commission met Tuesday and approved the waiver of design requirements for a new home proposed at 104 E. Olive Street in the Original Town Neighborhood.
- Staff held a Good Neighbor meeting for the proposed changes to Municipal Circle. This
 project would turn Municipal Circle into a one-way street and add angled parking for the
 surrounding buildings.
- Staff held a Good Neighbor meeting for the proposed reclassification of zoning of Heritage Hills Lots 158 thru 175, located on the south side of Pine Street, east of Madison Street, from R-1 (Single Family Residential) to R-2 (Single and Two-Family Residential).
- Director Jim Cadoret participated in a webinar on Transportation for Senior Residents sponsored by Grantmakers in Aging.
- Staff prepared the annual review of the Unified Development Code and will present several proposed amendments at the May 16 Planning & Zoning Commission meeting.

- Staff held the 2017 Summer Camp parent meeting on Monday, May 1. The meeting provided an opportunity for parents to ask questions, meet the staff and learn general information for the upcoming camp.
- Friday night the Raymore-Peculiar Foundation and the Parks & Recreation Department partnered to host the MAD (Make A Difference) Dash 5K Run/Walk at Recreation Park.
- Park staff prepared for the upcoming Grand Slam 10U & 11U baseball tournament and recreation soccer games on Saturday and Sunday.

Public Works

- On Sunday, utility staff responded to a water main break on 58 Highway near the
 entrance to Community Bank of Raymore and a second water main break on Monday at
 the intersection of S. Adams Street and 58 Highway. Repairs were completed with
 minimal disruption to water service. No precautionary measures were necessary. Final
 repairs and cleanup were completed on Friday, May 5.
- Engineering staff completed long-range pavement maintenance plans and curb replacement plans. Staff will present the findings from both plans to the city manager next week.
