"I am eager to work with our new Council members and excited for the future of our community," Mayor Kris Turnbow said. "Mr. Circo has been a strong advocate in our community and I look forward to seeing what he brings to the City Council each week."

Circo replaces Ward 2 Councilman Derek Moorhead,

who decided to step down from the Council. He won in a four-way race against Arts Commission member Loren Jones, residents Jim Peterman and Adam Embry.

Ward 1 Councilman Reginald Townsend, Ward 3 Councilman Jay Holman and Ward 4 Councilwoman Sonja Abdelgawad won re-election in their respective wards. Each ran unopposed.

# Trash Service Update

The City of Raymore and Jim's Disposal continue to work together to ensure residents receive the level of trash service they have come to expect.

On many of the trash routes throughout our community, Jim's Disposal features an automated truck that uses an extending arm to lift the trash cart and dump refuse into the trash truck.

Although these trucks can move through a neighborhood and pick up trash more quickly than a traditional rear-loader, they do require more technical skill to operate both the truck and the extending arm.

To assist those employees on the ground, Jim's Disposal is asking residents to follow guidelines to ensure drivers can easily access the trash cart and minimize any accidental damage to items such as light poles and mailboxes.

1. Place trash carts at the end



of the driveway so that the lid opens toward the street.

2. If possible, place recycling on one side of your driveway and trash on the opposite side. At a minimum, the extending arm needs about three feet between carts to operate effectively. Please avoid placing the carts right next to one another.
3. Please keep carts at least three feet from other objects such as mailboxes, light poles, fire hydrants, or other vehicles.
4. If there is additional bagged trash or recycling outside the cart, please place it next to the cart rather than behind or on top of the cart.

Although simple, these rules will assist employees at Jim's Disposal and ensure that trash is picked up in a timely and professional manner.

Plastic Bags

Motor oil bottles and other automotive product bottles

Containers for household hazardous material, paint cans

Paper towels, tissues or napkins, plates or cups

Aseptic and waxed containers, like milk carton and juice boxes

# Public Works Plans Summer Projects

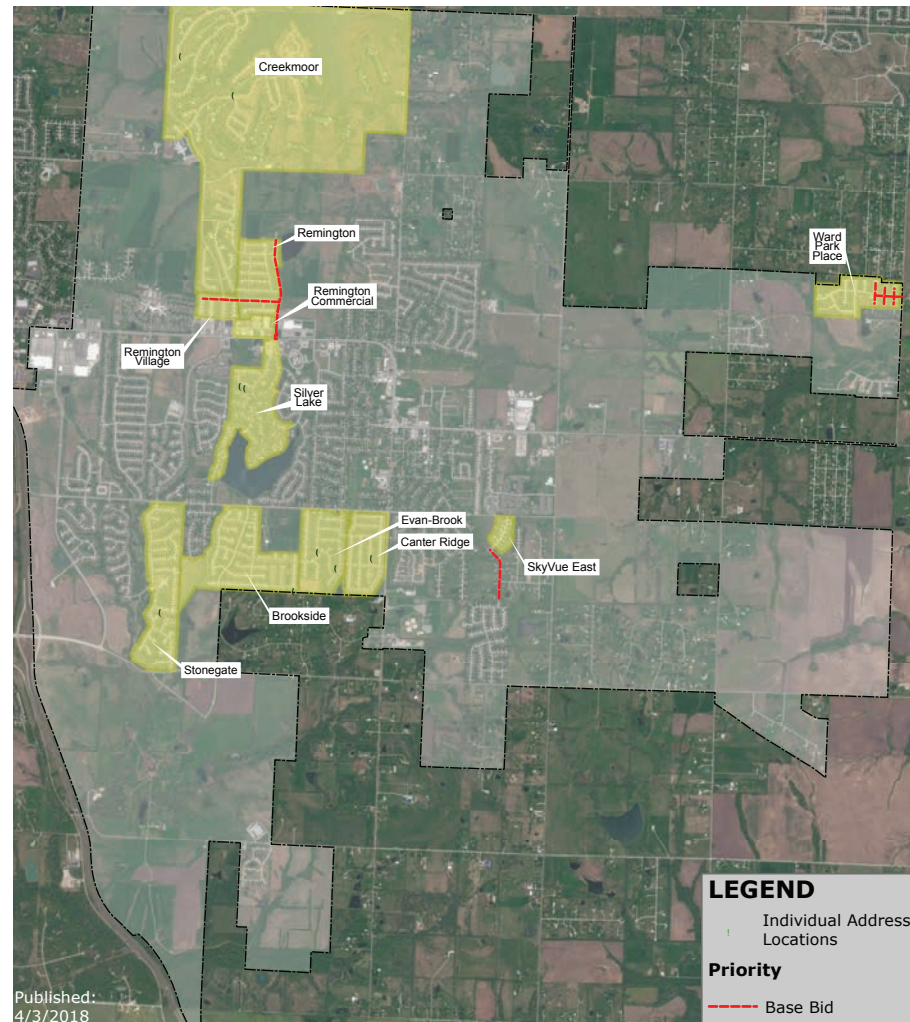
The City of Raymore's Public Works Department has a full schedule of summer and fall improvements including curb replacement, street preservation, crosswalk installation and the long-anticipated replacement of the 155th Street bridge. These projects make up more than \$8.9 million in infrastructure improvements throughout our community.

## ANNUAL CURB REPLACEMENT

With more than 240 miles of curb in Raymore aging at different rates, all of the curbs in our community were evaluated using a rating system. A five-year program was developed and approved by City Council in 2017 to replace the more than 200,000 feet of curb with damage and defects, and was updated in February 2018 to include a sixth year.

Each foot of curb costs approximately \$25 to replace, meaning the entire project will cost around \$5.5 million. The City Council has budgeted \$500,000 a year for curb replacement, so nearly 20,000 feet of curb will be replaced in the second year of the project.

To determine which curbs are addressed, Public Works



The City of Raymore's Annual Curb Replacement Plan for program year 2018.

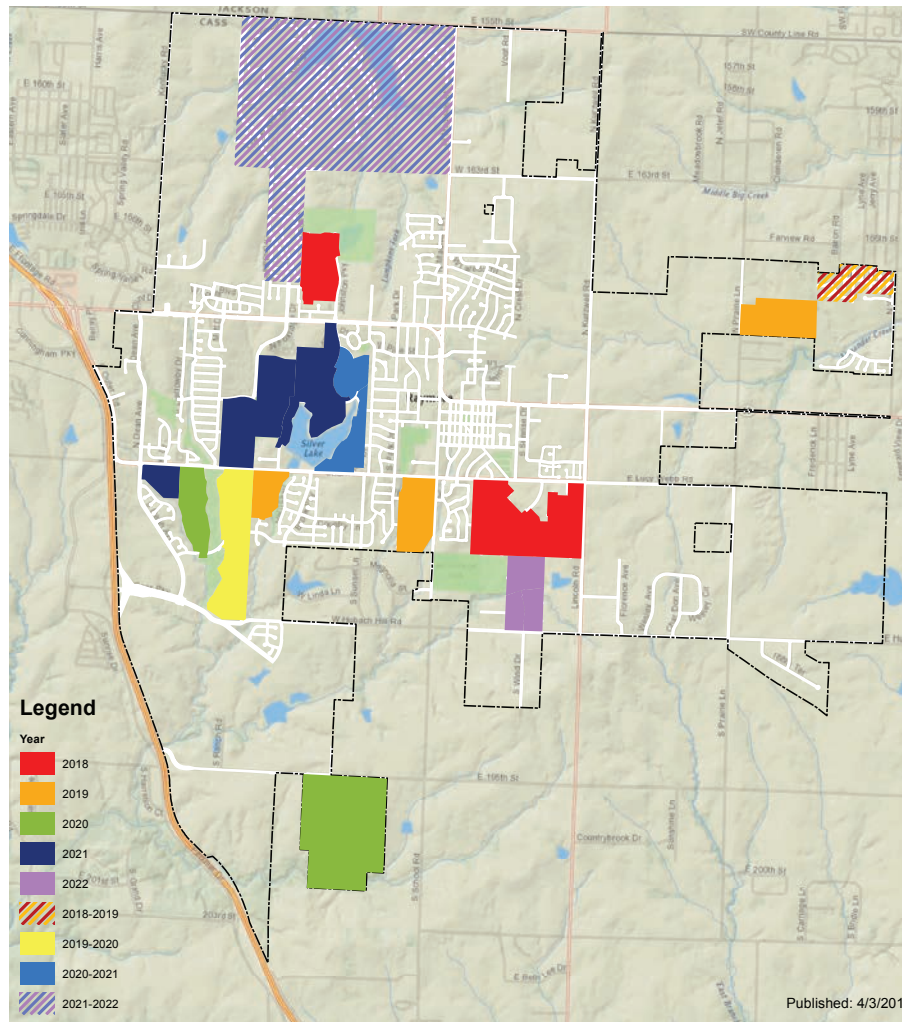
engineers assign each section of aging curb a rating number that easily describes the quality of the curb and helps determine which curbs qualify for replacement.

Condition Rating 1 includes minor cracks and small chips and this rating would not qualify the curb for replacement. Condition

Ratings 2 and 3 are more serious, with Condition Rating 3 including large broken sections, sections that have deteriorated to gravel and a combination of failures from the other ratings.

The map shows the areas within those subdivisions scheduled for curb replacement this year.

The City of Raymore's 5-Year Curb Replacement Plan for years 2018-2022.

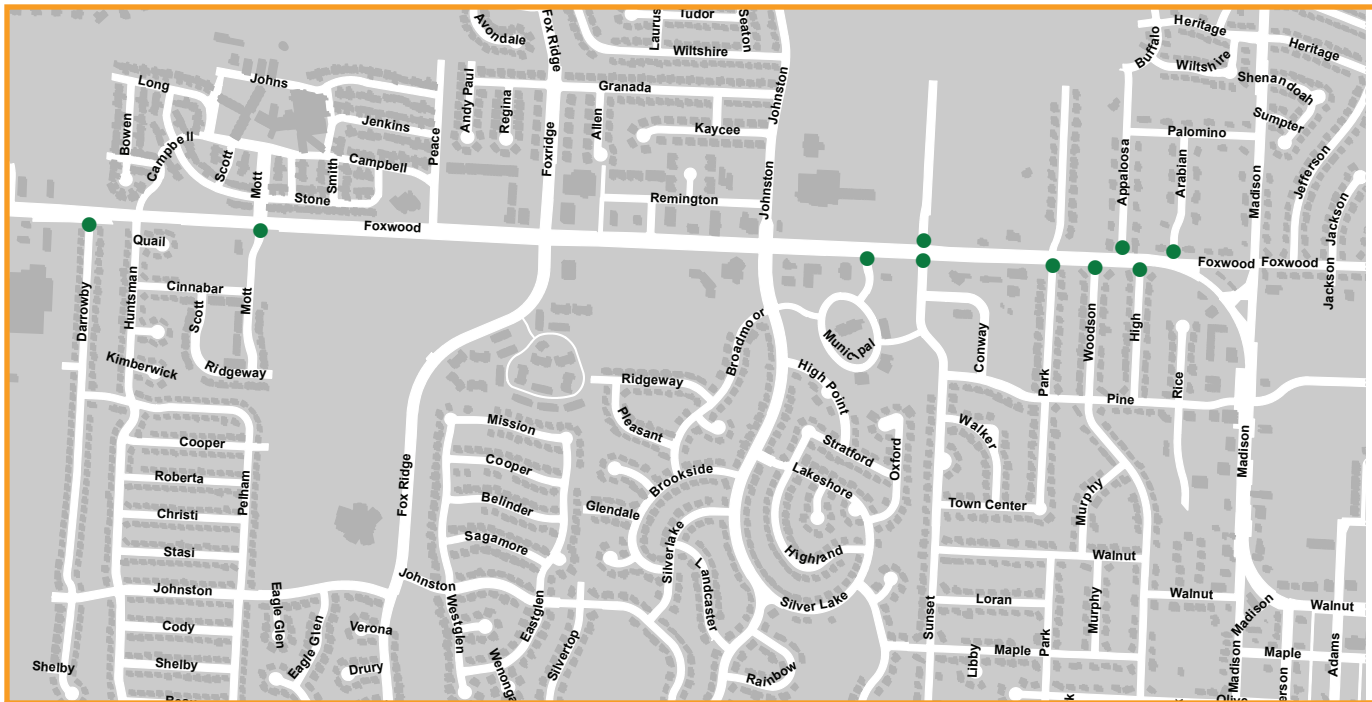
Public Works will hold to their scheduled plan and work closely with contractors to determine if there are any additional areas in need of immediate curb work. Critical spots that may be replaced outside of this plan include rough patches of curb at the ends of driveways that may damage vehicles.

### 2016 NO TAX INCREASE BOND PROJECTS

The extensions of Johnston and Foxridge Drives are in progress, with completion of Foxridge Drive expected at the end of May and Johnston Drive scheduled to be completed by the end of July.

Both projects were part of an overall \$10.05 million voter-approved list of projects in 2016 that included street and parks improvements. The extended roadway will help connect much-needed east-west roads in growing neighborhoods and allow residents to access Dean Avenue.

### STREET PRESERVATION

Later this summer, contractors will be making improvements to sections of the following roads and thoroughfares in our community: Drury Circle, Southwest Glen Drive, South Silvertop Lane, Wiltshire Boulevard, Seaton Boulevard, Shore Vista Court, South Madison Street, North Crest Drive and Kurzweil Road.

The City's street preservation project consists of three different pavement treatments: overlay of the streets with patching, micro surfacing and crack sealing. Each method helps extend the life of the roadway and improves safety for drivers.

Overlay work with patching and crack sealing will be done during the summer. After the extreme heat of summer, microsurfacing will begin on neighborhood roads throughout the city. Cooler temperatures are necessary for the microsurfacing to cure properly.

### CROSSWALKS

Crosswalks with permeable pavers that allow for drainage will be installed in 10 intersections throughout Raymore. Construction will take place between mid-June and mid-August. See the map for installation locations.



These crosswalks help improve safety at several busy intersections making it easier for both vehicles and pedestrians along 58 Highway.

### 155TH STREET BRIDGE

In 2015, the City of Kansas City, Mo., which owns half of the bridge, closed the two-lane bridge just east of Madison Street along 155th Street. Raymore officials came to an agreement with Kansas City to replace the bridge and take over complete ownership so Raymore could conduct regular maintenance on the roadway used by residents on the north side of the City.

Kansas City agreed to pay for half of the \$1.4 million project to repair the bridge and surrounding roadway.

The permitting process resulted in a delay to start the construction. Originally built 91 years ago, the original bridge was made of wood. After a rebuild in the 1980s, all but a few pieces of the original woodwork were removed. However, the

Army Corps of Engineers and Missouri Department of Natural Resources questioned whether the existing bridge was a historic structure.

All of the proper permitting has been in place since April and after expected approval by City Council in May, construction is scheduled to begin in June. The construction process will take approximately three months to complete, depending on weather.

After bridge construction is completed in late summer or early fall, the final phase of the 155th Street reconstruction will begin with overlay on 155th Street from North Madison Street to Kurzweil Road.

# Raymore Parks & Recreation: New Ways to Play

**M**ultiple projects are underway that will dramatically change the face of Raymore's parks system to meet the growing demand for active, engaging spaces for residents of all ages and abilities.

"We're looking forward to offering residents of all ages new and exciting ways to connect with the outdoors and with each other in our parks" Parks and Recreation Director Nathan Musteen said.

## **THE RAC**

Construction of the 16,000 square foot Raymore Activity

Center (RAC) at Recreation Park is well underway and scheduled to be completed this fall. This facility will allow for expanded programming and recreation opportunities year-round.

The multi-purpose activity center will have a gymnasium, indoor walking track, concessions kitchen and office space for staff. Parks & Recreation currently uses area school gymnasiums for winter sports programs and the Park House (909 S. Madison St.) for recreation classes and summer day camps. The lack of indoor space for programming has

long been a challenge for the department. The addition of the Raymore Activity Center will allow the department the room to expand its programming to better meet the needs of the growing Raymore community.

## **HAWK RIDGE PARK**

Some of the most dramatic changes to our City's parks will be coming to Hawk Ridge Park later this year. Designs are complete and construction is expected to begin this fall at Hawk Ridge Park, with an anticipated opening of the amenities in early 2019.





Design plans for Hawk Ridge Park include an amphitheater, walking trail, shelter house and more.

Residents will soon be able to enjoy (marked on the map):

- 1. A new amphitheater for theater, musical performances and other community arts programming
- 2. A new ADA dock and jetty on Johnston Lake for fishing
- 3. A paved walking trail around the lake
- 4. A new shelter house with restrooms
- 5. Additional restrooms
- 6. Expanded parking

Additionally, the city has partnered with the St. Louis-based non-profit Unlimited Play to help design and build Cass County’s first all-inclusive playground at Hawk Ridge Park. Funding for this portion of the park will come from a variety of

sources, including community fundraising, as we work to provide ample play spaces for all children of all abilities.

**T.B. HANNA STATION**

Next year, a spray park, ice rink and train-themed playground will be part of the offerings at T.B. Hanna Station, home of the Farmers Market, food truck festivals, Summer Scene, the Mayor’s Tree Lighting and other City events. Construction is slated to begin in late summer or early fall and is expected to be complete in 2019.

# Feral Cats Get Second Chance With Animal Control Program

**F**ollowing a spike in the number of feral cats in our community, Animal Control's feral-to-barn cat program is successfully reducing that number while giving feral cats a second chance at life in the country.

## **A DIFFERENT "TNR" PROGRAM**

Trap-neuter-return programs are popular in other cities, but Raymore uses a trap-neuter-relocate program where feral cats are sterilized and vaccinated before being relocated to rural areas as barn cats.

"This has proven to be extremely successful and is simply the most progressive action to curb the feral cat population in our City," Animal Control Officer Jamie Hasenyager said. "Although trap-neuter-return programs have been very successful in other cities to reduce feral cat populations over time, Raymore does not currently have an ordinance allowing the return of an unowned, loose cat to the place it was taken from."

So far, Raymore Animal Control has had the resources to take these ferals and relocate them to rural areas to live their lives

as barn cats, controlling rodent populations in outbuildings. In 2017, they successfully removed more than 70 feral cats from the dangers of living in the streets and sewers and gave each of them a new lease on life as a barn cat.

It's not as easy as just dropping a cat off at the barn — or greenhouse, shop, warehouse, etc. There are some important steps that need to be followed in order for a feral cat to accept the barn as its home. Our animal control officers are educating not only potential barn cat owners on this important process, but also



other animal control agencies in the region that have taken notice of the work of Raymore Animal Control.

There is a two- to three-week transition period for a feral cat to acclimate to its new home. To ensure that it doesn't run away and become open to dangers such as predators and vehicle traffic, the cat is contained with a litter box during this time and its caretaker must be prepared for things to be messy.

A caretaker needs to provide adequate shelter year-round from varying weather conditions and predators, as well as water and food on a daily basis. Cats cannot live on mousing alone, but you can bet they'll do an amazing job of keeping an outbuilding rodent-free once they know they have a safe place to call home.

Don't have an outbuilding but want to help the cause?

1. Most importantly, spay and neuter your cats!
2. Keep an ID tag on your cat at all times, even if they never go outside. If they accidentally slip out the door into

unfamiliar territory, chances are slim they'll be found and returned to you without proper identification.

3. Make sure you're ready to commit for the life of the cat when you adopt or take in a cat. Kittens are not kittens forever. Remember that you are their whole life, and the commitment can be anywhere from a few to up to 20 years!
4. Sponsor a feral cat. It takes time and money to trap, vaccinate, sterilize and find homes. Just \$30 will pay for the rabies vaccination and sterilization of a barn cat. Make a secure donation on our website at [raymore.com/animalcontrol](http://raymore.com/animalcontrol)

# Dispatchers Recognized for Dedication to Public Service

**R**aymore Police Department dispatchers were recognized for their service and commitment to their profession during the week of April 8-14 for National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week (NPSTW).

Held every year in the second week of April, NPSTW is dedicated to honoring the professionals who serve as the primary link between the public and emergency services. These

unseen helpers are the first to render aid over the phone in an emergency and are responsible for coordinating the response of police, fire and medical personnel.

Mayor Kristofer Turnbow recognized the Raymore Police Department's nine dispatchers at the April 9 City Council meeting. The Mayor read a proclamation of National Public Safety Telecommunicators Week

in the City of Raymore in honor of the men and women "whose diligence and professionalism keep our City and citizens safe."

The police department highlighted each dispatcher throughout the week on their Facebook page.

Rodney Ulsh has been dispatching with the Raymore Police Department for 33 years.



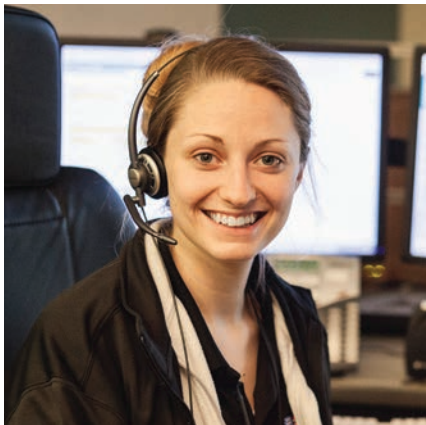
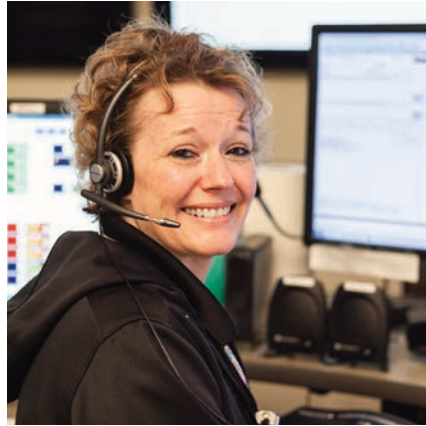
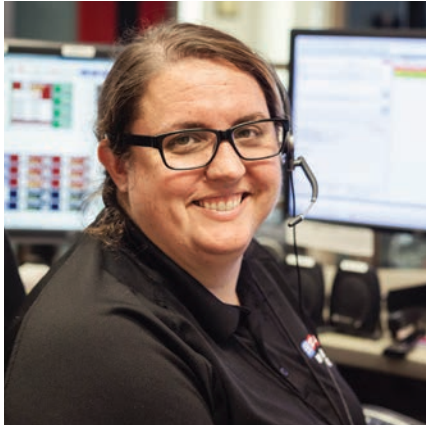
"The satisfaction I get from the job is knowing that I am a helper, because I know at the end of each day that I have helped someone, possibly on one of the worst days of their life," Ulsh said.

The Raymore Police Department has eight full-time and one supervisor who dispatch for Raymore and Peculiar Police Departments, Animal Control and the South Metro Fire Protection District.

The highly trained professionals manage seven non-emergency and six emergency phone lines

around the clock, 365 days a year. Raymore dispatchers answered 10,000 9-1-1 calls and 42,000 non-emergency calls in 2017.

"We rely on our dispatchers to give us information in a timely fashion when we're going to our calls for service, which can at times be very stressful. They always get us the information that we need when we need it in order to help us stay safe and handle our calls in a professional manner," Sgt. John Bergman said. "We appreciate all that they do." ●
