Residents Invited to Provide Feedback on City Budget

he City's proposed annual budget, released in August, is now before the City Council. Residents will have the opportunity to weigh in on the proposed budget at two public hearings this fall. The Planning & Zoning Commission and City Council will hold public hearings on the capital improvement budget and annual budget that will guide the City through 2019. The budget will remain a discussion point at all City Council work sessions, but will be up for approval at the following meetings:

Tuesday, Sept. 4 // 7 p.m. // City Hall

The Planning & Zoning Commission will hold a public hearing on the Capital Improvement Budget. This budget directs what major construction projects the City will undertake the next fiscal year.

n 2016, the City Council invited residents to a series of interactive community conversations and asked them to reimagine Raymore and help envision what the City would look like in 5–10 years. The process helped the Council and City staff to develop Raymore's first comprehensive strategic plan.

The City Council is once again inviting residents to have their voice heard about the future of Raymore at the Community
Conversation to be held on
Oct. 1 (see page 5 for details).
The Council plans to revisit the
exciting conversations from the
meetings held in 2016 to ensure
that recent completed projects,
future plans and the overall
strategic plan for the City still
hold true to that original vision.

"Our residents are at the heart of everything we do," Mayor Kris Turnbow said. "This process gave the City Council an unprecedented peek into the what our residents want as we continue to grow as a community."

Under the guidance of University of Kansas Public Management Center, the City received an incredible number of ideas and input from more than 350 residents. This information helped build the foundation of a strategic plan that is guiding

the growth and prosperity of Raymore. Using data from those public meetings, as well as several other sources, staff refined goals and created strategic initiatives and action steps to support the overall strategic plan.

The original community conversations also helped the City refine a number of projects

that were up for approval by residents in April 2016. Those voter-approved projects — totalling \$10.05 million worth of improvements to the City's streets and parks programs — are more than halfway completed. As we work to complete the last few projects, it's time to ask our residents to come back for another conversation.

Help Prevent Crime in Your Neighborhood

- Good neighbors make safer communities take the time to get to know them!
- Lock your doors. Many criminals take advantage of easy targets and many break-ins are due to unlocked cars and homes, so always lock your doors to prevent being the victim of a "crime of opportunity."
- Don't leave valuables in your car or unsecured in your house;
 it's an open invitation for thieves to steal.
- Keep exterior lights on overnight, or consider installing motion-detector type flood lights. Criminals prefer dimly lit greas.
- Immediately call 911 to report any suspicious activity.

- Set up a Neighborhood Watch Program in your neighborhood (or find out if your subdivision already has one) by contacting Capt. Jim Wilson at 816-331-0530 or jwilson@raymore.com.
- When going out of town, notify a neighbor and have your mail and newspaper deliveries stopped.

Hawk's Nest: A Playground for Children of All Abilities

magine a place where limitations are forgotten and differences are celebrated.

A place where children with physical and social developmental challenges and illnesses can happily play together with their peers and families.

The City of Raymore and Raymore Parks & Recreation, along with the help of our community, plan to turn that idea into a reality with a stateof-the-art inclusive playground. The playground, Hawk's Nest at Hawk Ridge Park, will be specifically designed to remove physical and social barriers so all children, with and without disabilities, can play side-byside.

To bring the project to fruition, the City has teamed up with Unlimited Play, an award-winning not-for-profit organization that helps plan, design and build fully accessible playgrounds that allow children of all abilities to enjoy the benefits of play.

Hawk's Nest will be a naturethemed playground. Each piece of equipment is custom-designed so that children with disabilities can swing, slide and climb with their friends, siblings, parents and caregivers.

HAWK'S NEST PLAYGROUND WILL INCLUDE:

- Safe, smooth, spongy surfacing
- Ramps from bottom to top
- Transfer stations throughout
- Specialized seating and handholds
- Slanted/graduated climbing elements
- High back swings
- Saucer swings
- Stainless steel and molded slides
- Musical elements
- Parallel play
- Fun, educational play panels
- Shaded areas

Initially, an accessible playground was planned for the park, meaning it would be easy for anyone to get to and maneuver through the area, but an accessible playground wouldn't necessarily cater to the needs of children with disabilities or allow them to play with children with different abilities

The decision to upgrade Hawk Ridge Park's playground from an accessible to an inclusive playground was not a tough one. Still, though the road to completion will be a bit more challenging, as each piece of custom equipment for the playground comes with a larger investment.

"When Parks Superintendent Steve Rulo and I learned about these playgrounds, we realized this is something we need for our community," Parks and Recreation Director Nathan Musteen said. "We knew we needed to go all out and do this right the first time and take away those barriers that have kept children from being able to play in the past. Play is such an important part of our lives and we don't want any child, or adult for that matter, missing out on that joy because there aren't pieces of play equipment to suit their needs, no matter what challenges they may be facing."

Funding for this playground will come from a variety of sources, including community fundraising.

Experience Year-Round Fun at the Raymore Activity Center

he Raymore Activity
Center (RAC) will open in
September, bringing with it
additional recreation and sports
programming opportunities for all
ages to our growing community.

The 16,000 square-foot multipurpose gymnasium in Recreation Park, 1011 S. Madison St., allows for recreational activities yearround and offers a full basketball court, an indoor walking/running track, a kitchen for concessions and office space for staff. The first programs slated to take place this fall include adult womens and coed recreational volleyball, recreation and competitive youth basketball, youth futsal and a physical education class for homeschoolers.

For years, the Parks & Recreation Department has been challenged to find enough indoor space for its programs, and had been using the limited space of the Park House at 909 S. Madison St. for recreation classes and summer day camp.

"We're so excited to have this multi-use facility to offer quality programming to fit the needs of our growing community," Parks & Recreation Director Nathan Musteen said. "It's extremely rewarding to see residents from young to old being active and interacting with one another at the RAC."

Raymore Awarded Grant for **AARP Community Challenge**

he City of Raymore is one of two communities in Missouri and among 129 throughout the country to receive funds through the 2018 AARP Community Challenge grant program.

Through this grant, a new paved and stamped ADA crosswalk will be added to Municipal Circle in front of the Centerview event space to improve safety for pedestrians, bicyclists and motorists, and to increase connectivity between nearby businesses and City Hall.

A total of \$1.3 million will be distributed to fund 129 "quick action" projects across the country, helping communities achieve one or more of the following goals:

- Deliver a range of transportation and mobility options that increase connectivity, walkability, bikeability and/ or access to public and private transit.
- Create vibrant public spaces that improve open spaces, parks and access to other amenities.
- Support the ability of a range of housing that increases accessible and affordable housing options.

The program, now in its second year, received nearly 1,600 applications from non-profits and government entities.

The grant requires projects to be completed by Nov. 5; however, construction for this project is already underway.

The City has also installed ADA ramps at intersections around Municipal Circle at Skyline and Broadmoor Drives to further improve safety for pedestrian wheelchair users.

City forms not-for-profit organization

hether it is a food and blanket donation to the Animal Shelter, a donation to the City's growing arts classes or the sponsorship of a memorial bench in one of our parks, our residents have shown, time and again, that they are some of the most generous in the region.

To help support that generosity, the Raymore City Council this past January voted to form the Raymore Community Foundation, a 501(c)3 not-for-profit aimed at supporting those programs where our residents have a special vested interested.

"Our residents give not because they have to, but because they, like so many others, feel such a strong sense of community and pride for the work we can accomplish together," Mayor Kris Turnbow said.

The Council formed the foundation to specifically support special projects in the Arts
Commission, Parks & Recreation
Department, Police Department and Animal Shelter. Residents have always been able to donate, but with the foundation, each donation will come with a tax deduction and recognition from the City for their kindness.

"If someone wants to donate a meal to our hardworking officers or blankets for our cats and dogs at the Animal Shelter, the Raymore Community Foundation is going to be there to help facilitate those donations,"

Turnbow said.

One of the first major campaigns

that will be undertaken by the foundation will be fundraising for the new inclusive playground at Hawk Ridge Park that will provide a play space for all children regardless of physical or sensory disabilities. It would be the first inclusive playground in Cass County and one of only three in the entire Kansas City metropolitan region.

"The foundation will be a key partner in helping us fundraise for the additional amenities,"
Parks & Recreation Director
Nathan Musteen said. "A
playground that welcomes all
children is simply the right thing
to do for our residents and the
region."

Spaying & Neutering: It's Best for Pets

here is a homeless pet dilemma across the United States. Unfortunately, this results in the euthanization of nearly 3 million healthy dogs and cats each year simply due to a lack of homes for these animals.

Your local no-kill Raymore Animal Shelter cares for unwanted pets on a daily basis. So far this year, our Animal Control officers have adopted out, or transferred to larger facilities in hopes of faster adoption, more than 135 abandoned cats and dogs, including several litters of kittens born at the shelter. So where

does spaying and neutering come in?

"One unspayed cat can have possibly more than 100 kittens in her lifetime, and if her kittens aren't sterilized either, the numbers are staggering in just a few years time," Animal Control Officer Jamie Hasenyager said. "Bailey (Romi, ACO) and I love each animal that comes through our doors, but sometimes we also struggle with finding these animals homes. Some of their situations are heartbreaking. We hope that by sharing information on the importance of spaying

and neutering your pets and responsible pet ownership as much as we can, we'll make a difference here in Raymore and beyond when it comes to unwanted and abandoned animals."

BEHAVIORAL AND MEDICAL BENEFITS

Besides helping to curb pet homelessness, there are numerous behavioral and medical benefits to spaying and neutering your pets.

"For medical reasons, spaying or neutering your pet reduces the risk of some and completely

eliminates the risk of other types of cancers in your dog or cat," Dr. Matt Scheele of Raymore Animal Clinic said. "For instance, in a female, spaying eliminates the risk of ovarian cancer and reduces the risk of mammary cancer later in life. It also reduces the risk of a serious and potentially deadly uterine infection called pyometra. In males, neutering eliminates the risk of testicular cancer and greatly reduces the risk of prostate and other types of cancers."

Reducing or eliminating risks of certain cancers leads to a longer life span. Studies have shown that neutered and spayed dogs and cats also have a reduced urge to roam, limiting their exposure to potentially deadly hazards such as fights with other animals and getting hit by cars.

Other behaviors that can be improved by spay/neuter include

the urge to spray or mark, aggression, excessive barking, mounting or other dominance-related habits. However, it is important to remember that spaying or neutering pets won't change their basic behaviors, such as their protective instinct.

WHEN TO SPAY/NEUTER

Dr. Scheele advises that it's better to wait until bigger dogs are a year old to get them neutered or spayed to give their bones more time to develop; otherwise six months is the general age for this procedure.

While many shelters advocate early neutering and spaying for cats since they cannot be adopted until they are sterilized, there are studies that support both early neutering and waiting until the kitten is a bit older: ask your veterinarian's advice to help you decide.
